1974

The Florida Capital Sesquicentennial is commemorated in Tallahassee at Centennial Field and elsewhere.

1971

Florida Memory

James Ford is elected the first African American to the Tallahassee City Commission since Reconstruction and becomes the first elected Black mayor of a United States capital city the next year.

1977

Construction of the new Capitol in Tallahassee is finished and it is agreed that the 1902 Historic Capitol building will become a museum.

1985

Hurricane Kate knocks out power in most of the city and county for two weeks.

1986

1990

Anita Davis becomes the first African American woman elected to the Leon County Commission.

FSU's National High Magnetics Field Laboratory (MagLab) opens. It would become the largest and highest-powered magnet lab in the world.

The first Leon Academy opens for white students. It would eventually become Leon High School in its present location on East Tennessee Street.

March 3, 1845 Florida is admitted to the Union as the 27th state. Florida's territorial period is over.

ALMOST 12,000 YEARS AGO,

this region welcomed its early settlers. These ancient inhabitants laid the foundation for a rich history, crafting some of the most exquisite Native American pottery and engaging in trade that stretched as far as the Great Lakes.

In the period known as the Fort Walton era, spanning from 1000 A.D to 1575 A.D., the Lake Jackson mounds emerged as a pivotal political and ceremonial center. These mounds served as the heart of a vast village, surrounded by satellite villages and single-family farms. In the later years of this era, the land between the Aucilla and Ochlockonee Rivers teemed with a population of 30,000 people, all under the rule of a chief residing in the village of Anhayca, located about a mile east of the present-day Capitol building in Tallahassee.

The arrival of Europeans in 1528 marked a significant turning point. Spanish explorers, through conflict and disease, inflicted heavy losses on the native Apalachee population. However, by 1607, the Apalachee extended an invitation to the Spaniards to establish missions, some of which found their place here, with San Luis serving as the administrative hub.

The delicate balance was disrupted by British and Creek Indian raids in 1704, compelling both the Apalachee and Spaniards to abandon the area. Subsequently, the Creeks resettled the area, establishing large communities. In 1818, Andrew Jackson's raids forced them out once again.

On July 10, 1821, Florida officially transitioned from Spanish to American rule,

closing centuries of European dominance. This marked the beginning of a new era, with the establishment of territorial and local government functions. The Territorial Council, forerunner to the Florida legislature, held its inaugural meeting in June 1822 in Pensacola.

Recognizing the challenges of travel during that era, the council decided to find a central location for future meetings. In 1823, commissioners Dr. William H. Simmons of Pensacola and John Lee Williams of St. Augustine converged on a site near the abandoned Seminole village of Tallahassa Taloofa, where a small cascade added to the allure.

Governor William Pope DuVal proclaimed Tallahassee as the future meeting place on March 4, 1824. Congress then allocated a square mile of federal land on May 24, 1824, designating it as the new government seat for the Florida Territory. Work quickly began on temporary council quarters and, on Nov. 8, 1824, the council convened in Tallahassee and later that year, Leon County was officially created.

Over the next two decades, Tallahassee experienced rapid growth and transformative events. The St. Marks Railroad was chartered in 1835, followed by the Second Seminole War (1836-1842), a devastating yellow fever epidemic (1841), and the Great Fire (1843) which miraculously spared the Capitol building. Finally, on March 3, 1845, Florida joined the Union as the 27th state, firmly securing Tallahassee's place in American history.

COLLEGETOWN

Energetic, youthful, hip and exciting — in a word, FUN! College students, alumni and locals come here to stay, eat, drink and shop.

In the center of College Town stands **Hotel Indigo** — a boutique hotel designed to reflect Tallahassee's fascinating history as a railroad town with rail map motifs throughout the property.

Dining options in College Town range from pub grub to Cajun favorites. Madison Social gastropub serves up new-American small plates and sandwiches in a modern loft-style space with an expansive outdoor patio.

Little Masa is a fast-casual restaurant serving Asian-fusion favorites, including wok classics, noodles of Asia and fresh sushi, while Coosh's brings the flavors of Cajun favorites, including crawfish etouffee, jambalaya and red beans and rice.









SOUTHSIDE

Make your way to Tallahassee's growing Southside District. Anchored by one of the top Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) in the country, Florida A&M University, students keep this district lively with Rattler athletic events, dynamic performing arts and colorful murals.

For those interested in exploring the outdoors, try a stroll down the St. Marks Trail, a 16-mile paved trail connecting Florida's Capital City with the coastal community of St. Marks. Fuel up for the trail with a visit to Early's Kitchen or Olean's Cafe.

As the sun goes down, check out the live music scene at the House of Music or indulge in a craft cocktail at South Station.

No trip would be complete without sampling an award-winning craft beer at the area's largest brewery, **Proof Brewing Company**. Enjoy a rotating tap menu featuring more than 20 different styles.

MARKET DISTRICT

Located off I-10, Exit 203, The Market District is where you'll find locally owned, curated boutique shops for both men and women and a variety of restaurants and gardens to explore. Hearth & Soul features unique finds for the mind, body and home while clothing stores like Nic's Toggery have been providing classic styles to Tallahassee men for nearly 75 years.

Dining options abound with cuisine from across the globe. Little Paris brings the tastes and setting of a French café while Jeri's Love on a Plate serves up farm-to-table, high-quality ingredients sure to fill your belly and heart with love.

One of the area's most beautiful gardens can be found in the Market District — Alfred B. Maclay Gardens State Park. A masterpiece of floral architecture, the park features a picturesque brick walkway, secret garden, reflection pool and a plethora of blooming flowers.







TAKE TO THE WATER WITH HARRY SMITH OUTDOORS

BY HARRY SMITH, OUTFITTER, GUIDE, OWNER OF HARRY SMITH OUTDOORS

Having grown up in Tallahassee with the outdoors as my playground, exploring the area's 700-plus miles of trails, hiking, biking, fishing and kayaking became my way of life. The area's freshwater, spring-fed rivers — the Wakulla, Wacissa and St. Marks — are easy to explore and offer some of the most diverse wildlife viewing in Florida.

Paddling trails also lead to secluded hiking trails offering otherworldly scenes of nature, like the quiet and serene Cathedral of Palms or the Leon Sinks trail in the Apalachicola National Forest, with fairytale-like views providing a glimpse into "Old Florida."

Those looking for a more social paddling experience enjoy Lake Bradford where on the most southern portion of the lake lies the Florida State Reservation, or the "rez". It's a popular spot to rent kayaks, canoes, paddleboards and even sailboats to explore the wonders of Lake Bradford. Lake Piney Z takes front and center stage to Lafayette Heritage Trail Park on Tallahassee's east side where visitors can enjoy many outdoor activities, like biking, fishing, running, walking, kayaking and canoeing, without ever leaving the city.

Harry is a Tallahassee native who grew up on the banks of Lake Talquin fishing, boating, hiking and camping. Those pastimes ignited a passion that carries on today. Now as an outfitter, guide and owner of Harry Smith Outdoors, he takes great joy in showing people the beauty that Tallahassee and the surrounding area have to offer.

- RIVER: The Wacissa, because all parts of it are outstanding. The upper headwaters section is easy to reach, beautiful, and full of wildlife.
- » SPRING: Garner Springs off the Wacissa River. It is reached by a narrow spring that runs about a third-of-a-mile long, where visitors often see wildlife - otters, baby alligators, barred owls, etc.
- » LAKE: Put in your canoe or kayak at Jack Vause Landing to explore the roughly 10,000-acre Lake Talquin.

Tallahassee lies in one of the most biologically diverse regions of the United States, making it a perfect destination to see incredible birds and wildlife. Whether you prefer a leisurely hike in a local park or an off-the-beaten-path adventure, there is abundant wildlife to see almost everywhere you look.

St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge is a must-visit for anyone who is birding in the Panhandle. A leisurely drive to the coast along Lighthouse Road will yield sightings of bald eagles, wading birds and flocks of winter ducks. The refuge has also seen many unexpected species over the years, with recent visitors including a vermillion flycatcher and an American flamingo! Visitors to Edward Ball Wakulla Springs State Park can take a guided boat tour to see black-crowned night herons, flocks of white

ibis and even manatees in the cooler winter months. A drive along quiet wildflower-lined roads will take you to Apalachicola National Forest, one of the best places in the country to see the federally endangered red-cockaded woodpecker among the longleaf pines.

You don't have to travel far to see incredible wild sights — within county limits, you can visit Elinor Klapp-Phipps Park, Alfred B. Maclay Gardens State Park and Lafayette Heritage Trail Park. Explore miles of wellmaintained trails as you look for migrating birds in spring and fall. Be sure not to overlook Lake Elberta Park; this small park just minutes from downtown boasts a bird list of nearly 200 species. For an in-town adventure that's off the beaten path, explore L. Kirk Edwards Wildlife and Environmental Area, where you can see Bachman's sparrows, wood storks and gopher tortoises.

Grab your binoculars and camera, put on your hiking boots and hit the trail in Tallahassee, every day is a great day to go birding!

Stops along the way include 13 historically significant sites in downtown Tallahassee, from the Florida Historic Capitol Museum to the Civil Rights Heritage Walk, which commemorates more than 50 foot soldiers. You can learn about eras unique to our state at the Museum of Florida History, enjoy beautiful scenery at Cascades Park, take a brief walk to Smokey Hollow Historic District, and then stroll up the street to the John G. Rilev Center and Museum. From there, visit the "House that Rhymes," where the Emancipation Proclamation was first read at the Knott House. You can cool off with a drink at the historic Bar 1903. Continue down the Chain of Parks while viewing First Presbyterian Church, which was constructed in 1838, then to the **Old City Cemetery** — a final resting place for men and women who contributed to the Development of Tallahassee and state of Florida.

Additional sites to visit include the Soul Voices: Frenchtown Heritage Trail and the Grove Museum near the Governor's Mansion.

The Heritage Trail was developed in partnership with Leon County, The Tallahassee Downtown Improvement Authority, John G. Riley House Museum, City of Tallahassee, Florida Department of State, the Tallahassee Historical Society, and local community leaders.
